A SAMPLE WORKSHEET ROUTINE FOR MAXIMUM IMPACT

How can a parent or teacher structure a lesson around a worksheet for the best results? Here is a simple, effective routine.

- Warm-Up (5 minutes):** Start with a quick verbal review. Ask the student, "What is a noun?" "What are the two main types of nouns?" (Common/Proper). This activates prior knowledge.
- Direct Instruction (5-10 minutes):** Introduce the specific concept on the worksheet (e.g., "Today, we are going to learn about collective nouns. A collective noun names a group, like a team or a flock."). Provide a few examples on the whiteboard or a piece of paper.
