

How To Treat Mange In Dogs

THE TWO MAIN TYPES OF MANGE: SARCOPTIC VS. DEMODECTIC

Sarcoptic Mange (Canine Scabies)

Symptoms include patchy hair loss, bald spots, and sometimes mild redness, but itching is usually less intense than in sarcoptic mange unless a secondary bacterial infection develops.

RECOGNIZING THE SYMPTOMS OF MANGE

Being able to recognize the early signs of mange will help you seek veterinary care sooner. While the symptoms can overlap with other skin conditions like allergies or fungal infections, some patterns are very suggestive of mite infestations. Common symptoms include:

- Intense itching and scratching, particularly at night (more common in sarcoptic mange)
- Hair loss, often starting on the face, ears, elbows, and hocks
- Red, inflamed, or scaly skin
- Thick, crusty patches or sores
- A musty, unpleasant odor from the skin, especially if a secondary infection is present
- Thickening of the skin in chronic cases
- Lethargy or changes in appetite due to discomfort

If your dog exhibits any of these signs, it is essential to consult a veterinarian for an accurate diagnosis.

HOW VETERINARIANS DIAGNOSE MANGE

You cannot simply look at a dog and reliably determine **how to treat mange in dogs** without a proper diagnosis. Vets perform a simple and quick test called a skin scrape. They gently scrape the surface of the skin with a scalpel blade to collect a sample of skin cells and debris. This sample is then examined under a microscope to look for the characteristic mites, their eggs, or their feces. While a skin scrape is highly effective for demodectic mange (where mites are numerous), sarcoptic mites can be more difficult to find because they burrow deep. In some cases, a vet may recommend a trial treatment based on symptoms if sarcoptic mange is strongly suspected, even if the scrape is negative.

PROVEN METHODS: HOW TO TREAT MANGE IN DOGS

Now we arrive at the core of the matter. Treatment strategies have evolved significantly in recent years, offering effective and relatively safe options for managing both types of mange. The specific protocol your vet recommends will depend on the type of mange, the severity of the infestation, and your dog's overall health status.

Prescription Medications: The Gold Standard

For decades, dips and topical treatments were the standard of care. Today, modern oral and topical medications have transformed the treatment landscape.

- **Isoxazoline Class Drugs (e.g., Simparica, NexGard, Bravecto, Credelio):** These are broad-spectrum flea and tick preventatives that have proven highly effective against both sarcoptic and demodectic mange. They are typically given as oral chews or topical solutions on a monthly or quarterly basis. Many vets now consider these the first-line treatment for mange because they are extremely safe, convenient, and effective. Treatment is often continued for two to three months beyond a negative skin scrape.

- **Ivermectin and Milbemycin Oxime:** These older, avermectin-class drugs are effective but must be used with caution. They are administered either orally or by injection and require careful dosing by a veterinarian. Importantly, these drugs can cause severe neurological side effects in certain dog breeds, particularly Collies, Shetland Sheepdogs, and other herding breeds with a genetic mutation (MDR1 gene). Your vet will advise you on safety testing before using these treatments.
- **Lime Sulfur Dips:** While less common now due to the availability of safer oral medications, lime sulfur dips are still used, especially for sarcoptic mange in puppies or dogs that cannot take oral medications. This treatment has a strong, unpleasant odor (like rotten eggs) and can temporarily stain light-colored fur. It requires weekly application for several weeks.
- **Topical Spot-On Treatments (e.g., Revolution/Stronghold, Advocate/Advantage Multi):** These prescription-only spot-on products contain active ingredients that kill mites. They are applied to the skin on the back of the neck once a month. While effective, they are often considered a second-line choice compared to the isoxazoline class due to the latter's superior efficacy in severe cases.

Treating Secondary Infections

Mange often leads to secondary bacterial or yeast infections because the damaged skin barrier allows pathogens to enter. **Treatment of these concurrent infections is a critical component of how to treat mange in dogs effectively.** Your vet may prescribe:

- **Oral Antibiotics:** For treating bacterial pyoderma (skin infection).
- **Medicated Shampoos:** Chlorhexidine or benzoyl peroxide shampoos can help reduce bacterial and yeast populations on the skin. These are often used two to three times per week during the initial phase of treatment.
- **Topical Creams or Sprays:** For localized infections.

Treating the secondary infection not only improves your dog's comfort but also helps the skin heal faster, creating an environment less favorable for mite proliferation.

SUPPORTIVE CARE AT HOME

Veterinary treatment is the cornerstone of recovery, but home care plays a vital role in getting your dog back to health. Here are essential steps you can take to support your dog's recovery.

Environmental Management

For sarcoptic mange, environmental decontamination is important because mites can survive off the host for a short period (a few days). Wash all bedding, blankets, and collars in hot water and dry on high heat. Vacuum carpets, upholstery, and dog beds thoroughly and discard the vacuum bag. For demodectic mange, environmental cleaning is not necessary since the mites are normal residents of the dog's skin and cannot survive in the environment.

Nutritional Support and Immune Health

A strong immune system is crucial, especially for demodectic mange. Ensure your dog is eating a high-quality, balanced diet rich in essential fatty acids (Omega-3 and Omega-6), which support skin health. Your vet may recommend supplements like fish oil or a specialized dermatologic diet. Avoid giving your dog unnecessary vaccinations or immunosuppressive medications during treatment, as these can interfere with recovery.

Soothing the Itch

Itching can be severe, especially during the early stages of treatment. While the anti-mite medications will eventually stop the itching, you can provide relief in the meantime. Mild oatmeal baths or a diluted solution of apple cider vinegar (always check with your vet first) can offer short-term relief. In some cases, your vet may prescribe a short course of anti-inflammatory medications or antihistamines to manage the itch without interfering with the mite-killing drugs.

COMMON MISTAKES WHEN TREATING MANGE AT HOME

The internet is full of home remedies, many of which are ineffective or even harmful. Avoid these common pitfalls when you are learning **how to treat mange in dogs**:

1. **Using motor oil or kerosene:** These are extremely toxic and can cause severe skin burns and systemic poisoning. Never use them on a dog.
2. **Excessive bathing:** Bathing too frequently can strip the skin of its natural oils and worsen irritation.
3. **Stopping treatment too early:** Mange requires persistence. Stopping medication as soon as your dog looks better often leads to a relapse. Always complete the full course recommended by your vet.
4. **Using leftover prescription medications:** Drugs that worked for one dog or one type of mange may be harmful or ineffective for another. Always use medications prescribed by a vet for your specific dog.

HOW LONG DOES TREATMENT TAKE?

For sarcoptic mange, treatment typically requires at least two to four weeks of continuous medication. For demodectic mange, treatment can take several months, sometimes up to a year, especially in severe or generalized cases. Your vet will perform follow-up skin scrapes to confirm that the mites have been eliminated. Treatment should continue for at least one month after a negative skin scrape to ensure all mites and eggs are gone.

PREVENTING FUTURE MANGE OUTBREAKS

Once your dog has recovered, you can take steps to prevent a recurrence. For sarcoptic mange, the easiest way to prevent reinfestation is to keep your dog on a monthly isoxazoline-based flea and tick preventative, which also kills sarcoptic mites. For demodectic mange, prevention focuses on

maintaining a robust immune system through good nutrition, regular veterinary care, and minimizing stress. Dogs that develop demodectic mange as puppies often grow out of it and never have a recurrence. However, adult-onset demodicosis may indicate an underlying health issue that needs to be investigated, such as hypothyroidism, Cushing's disease, or cancer.
