## SAMPLE LEWIS STRUCTURE PROBLEMS AND

## ANSWERS

### Problem 1: Water ( $\text{H}_2\text{O}$ )

**Step 1:** Count valence electrons. Oxygen has 6, each hydrogen has 1, total = 8.

**Step 1:** Valence electrons: C = 4, each O = 6, total = 16.

**Step 2:** Central atom is carbon (least electronegative).

**Step 3:** Connect each O with a single bond (uses 4 electrons). Remaining 12 electrons.

**Step 4:** Give each O three lone pairs (uses 12 electrons). Now carbon has only 4 electrons — octet not satisfied.

**Step 5:** Form double bonds by moving one lone pair from each O

to share with carbon. After each double bond, carbon has 8 electrons, and each O still has two lone pairs.

**Answer:**  $\text{O}=\text{C}=\text{O}$  with two double bonds. Linear geometry. This is a classic example of satisfying the octet by multiple bonding.

### Problem 3: Ammonia ( $\text{NH}_3$ )

**Step 1:** N has 5, three H have 3 total = 8 valence electrons.

**Step 2:** Nitrogen central.

**Step 3:** Three N-H single bonds use 6 electrons.

**Step 4:** Remaining 2 electrons form one lone pair on nitrogen.

**Answer:** Nitrogen with three single bonds and one lone pair. Trigonal pyramidal shape.

### Problem 4: Nitrate Ion ( $\text{NO}_3^-$ )

**Step 1:** N = 5, O =  $6 \times 3 = 18$ , plus one extra electron from the negative charge = 24 valence electrons.

**Step 2:** Nitrogen central.

**Step 3:** Single bonds from N to each O use 6 electrons. Remaining 18.

**Step 4:** Give each O three lone pairs (uses 18). But then N has only 6 electrons — need an octet.

**Step 5:** Form one double bond by moving a lone pair from one O. Now N has 8 electrons. The double bond can be located on any of the three oxygens, leading to resonance structures. Formal

charges: N=0, double-bonded O=0, single-bonded O = -1 each.

**Answer:** Three resonance structures with one N=O double bond and two N-O<sup>-</sup> single bonds. This problem teaches resonance — a critical concept for polyatomic ions.
