It is crucial to distinguish this from pure luck. Luck is often seen as a random, external force for good or ill. Incidental happenstance, however, implies a dynamic interaction between the event and the individual. It requires an **active agent**—someone who notices, interprets, and acts upon the unplanned event. A lucky person wins the lottery; a person who leverages incidental happenstance meets someone at a party who introduces them to a new field of study. The former is passive; the latter is engaged.

## MAGIC

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If incidental happenstance is so powerful, why do we so often miss it? The answer lies deep within our cognitive architecture. The human brain is designed for efficiency, not serendipity. To navigate a complex world, we rely on mental shortcuts known as heuristics. We build routines, develop tunnel vision toward our goals, and filter out information that does not conform to our existing mental models. This is known as **selective attention**.

# Say Yes Before You Are Ready

Many opportunities presented by incidental happenstance are messy and unformed. They do not come with a guarantee. You might be invited to speak at an event you feel unqualified for, or to join a project in an industry you know nothing about. The natural instinct is to say no until you feel ready. But readiness is a myth. The most interesting paths are often built by those who say yes to the unplanned invitation and then figure it out as they go. This **bias toward action** in the face of uncertainty is a hallmark of those who leverage happenstance effectively.

## THE ROLE OF REFLECTION AND Create Space for Randomness

If your calendar is scheduled down to the minute, there is no room for incidental happenstance. You must intentionally create pockets of unstructured time. Take a different route to work. Visit a bookstore without a specific book in mind. Attend a conference outside of your field. Schedule "thinking time" or "walking meetings."
