Problem 3:

Algebra and Angle

Question: The interior angle of a regular polygon is 30° more than its exterior angle. Find the number of sides.

Solution:

Let the exterior angle be $\backslash(x\backslash)$. Then interior angle $= \backslash(x + 30\backslash)$.

Since they are supplementary: $\backslash(x + (x + 30) = 180\backslash)$.

$$\backslash(2x + 30 = 180\backslash)$$

$$\backslash(2x = 150\backslash)$$

$$\backslash(x = 75\backslash) \text{ (exterior angle).}$$

Number of sides $\backslash(n = 360 / 75 = 4.8\backslash)$. This is not an integer, so no such regular polygon exists with whole number sides? Wait, let me re-check the logic. Actually, for a regular polygon, interior and exterior are

supplementary, so interior + exterior = 180. If interior = exterior + 30, then exterior + 30 + exterior = 180, so $2 \times \text{exterior} = 150$, exterior = 75, $n = 360/75 = 4.8$. This suggests there is no regular polygon with whole number sides that satisfies this condition exactly. However, the problem could be a trick or the student is expected to recognize that a non-integer number of sides is impossible. Alternatively, the problem might be designed for irregular polygons or for approximation. In a standard worksheet, such a problem teaches critical thinking about the constraints of geometry.

COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM
