SAMPLE EXERCISES FOR A STEM AND LEAF PLOT WORKSHEET

Exercise 1: Basic Construction

Data set: 1.2, 1.5, 1.8, 2.0, 2.3, 2.6, 2.9, 3.1, 3.4. Decide how to represent the decimals (e.g., stem = whole number, leaf = tenths). Plot it and identify any clusters.

Exercise 3: Back-to-Back Comparison

Group A: 12, 15, 18, 21, 24, 27, 30.
Group B: 10, 13, 16, 19, 22, 25, 28.
Create a back-to-back plot with Group A on the right and Group B on the left. Which group has a higher median?

Exercise 4: Error

Analysis

Provide a flawed stem and leaf plot (e.g., leaves not ordered, missing key, incorrect stem). Ask students to identify and correct the mistakes.

TIPS FOR TEACHERS AND PARENTS USING WORKSHEETS

Whether you are guiding a classroom or helping your child at home, these strategies will make a **stem and leaf plot worksheet** more effective:

- **Start with physical manipulatives** – Use index cards with numbers to physically sort them into stems and leaves before writing on paper.

- **Not ordering leaves** – Skipping the step of arranging leaves in ascending order makes the plot hard to read. Remind students to always order after adding all

leaves.
