For a division equation like  $y \div 6 = 5$ , the operation is division. The inverse is

multiplication. Multiplying both sides by 6 gives  $y = 30$ .

addition equation, subtract the same number from both sides.

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**COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW GUIDED NOTES PREVENT THEM**

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Even with a clear strategy, students often stumble on predictable errors. Well-designed **solving one step equations guided notes** can anticipate and address these mistakes before they become habits.

## Mistake 1:

# Performing the Wrong Operation      Operation on One Side
