The exam is divided into two main sections:

- **Section I:
Multiple-Choice
Questions
(MCQs)** – 55 questions in 80 minutes, accounting for 50% of your score. These questions cover the entire course curriculum, including foundational documents, Supreme Court cases, and political behavior.
- **Section II:
Free-Response
Questions
(FRQs)** – 4 questions in 100

accounting for the other 50% of your score. These require you to write analytical essays, develop arguments, and apply concepts to real-world scenarios.

BUILDING YOUR AP GOVERNMENT AND POLITICS STUDY

BREAKDOWN

The course is divided into five major units, each with a specific weight on the exam. Your study guide should allocate time proportionally.

Unit 1: Foundations of American Democracy (15-22% of exam)

This unit sets the stage for everything else. You will explore the

philosophical underpinnings of the U.S. Constitution, the debates between Federalists and Anti-Federalists, and the key principles like separation of powers, checks and balances, and federalism. Key documents include the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution (Articles I-III), and *Federalist No. 10* and *Brutus No. 1*. In your **AP Government and Politics study guide**, make sure you can explain how these foundational texts influence modern governance.

Unit 2: Interactio

ns Among Branches of Governm ent (25-36% of exam)

The largest unit on the exam, this covers the legislative, executive, and judicial branches, as well as the bureaucracy. You need to understand the structure, powers, and functions of each branch, as well as how they interact. For example, how does Congress oversee the executive branch? How does the president

influence the judiciary? A good study guide will include a comparison chart of the branches and their checks on each other. Also, memorize key Supreme Court cases like *Marbury v. Madison*, *United States v. Lopez*, and *Baker v. Carr*.

Unit 3: Civil Liberties and Civil Rights (13-18% of exam)

This unit focuses on the Bill of Rights and its application through

the 14th Amendment's Due Process and Equal Protection clauses. You will study the selective incorporation doctrine and landmark cases like *Gideon v. Wainwright*, *Roe v. Wade*, *Brown v. Board of Education*, and *Tinker v. Des Moines*. Your **AP Government and Politics study guide** should help you differentiate between civil liberties (freedom from government) and civil rights (equal treatment under the law).

Unit 4: American Political Ideologie

s and Unit 5: BeliefsPolitical (10-15% Participat of exam) ion

This shorter unit examines political culture, public opinion, and the role of media and polling. Understand the difference between liberal, conservative, and libertarian views on economic and social issues. Be able to interpret polling data and understand how political socialization shapes beliefs. This is a great unit to practice quantitative analysis FRQs.

The second-largest unit covers voting behavior, political parties, interest groups, and elections. Key concepts include the Electoral College, campaign finance (e.g., *Citizens United v. Create a Concept Map of Interconnected Ideas

American government is a system of interlocking parts. For example, link the concept of “checks and balances” to specific historical examples like

President Truman’s veto of the Taft-Hartley Act, or the Supreme Court striking down executive orders. A concept map helps you see the big picture, which is essential for the argument essay.

Write Your Own FRQs and Answer Them

After studying a unit, try to simulate the exam. Write a concept application FRQ by finding a recent news article about a political issue (e.g., gerrymandering, presidential veto, Supreme Court nomination) and

analyze it using the concepts you learned. This will cement your understanding and improve your writing speed.

Form a Study Group for Discussion

Explaining concepts to peers is a powerful way to master them. In a study group, debate the merits of federalism versus unitary systems, or discuss how the Electoral College affects campaign strategies. These discussions mirror the critical thinking required on the exam.

COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID

Even with a solid **AP Government and Politics study guide**, many students make avoidable mistakes. Be aware of these common issues:

- **Memorizing Without Understanding:** Knowing the date of *Marbury v. Madison* (1803) is less important than understanding why it established judicial review.

clear thesis, using evidence from required documents or cases, and addressing a counterargument .

- **Overlooking Political Parties and Elections:** This content is heavily tested. Understand the evolution of party systems, the role of third

parties, and how elections are administered.
