You might need to determine which way a gear turns, how much force is required to lift a weight with a pulley system, or which lever arm provides the most mechanical advantage. No advanced physics is required, but a strong intuitive grasp of how things move and work is important. **Tip:** Look for free mechanical aptitude practice tests online or watch videos that explain simple machine principles.

4. Spatial Visualization

Perhaps the most unique section, spatial visualization evaluates your ability to mentally manipulate two- and three-dimensional objects. You might be shown a flat shape and asked to imagine what it looks like when folded into a three-dimensional box, or given a stack of blocks and asked to count how many are there from a different perspective. This skill is critical for reading blueprints, interpreting layout marks on steel, and envisioning how structural components fit together before they are lifted into place. **Tip:** Practice with online spatial reasoning tests, or simply try to mentally rotate everyday objects around you.

HOW TO PREPARE EFFECTIVELY FOR THE TEST

Question: Two gears are meshed together. Gear A has 20 teeth and Gear B has 40 teeth. If Gear A rotates clockwise at 100 RPM, which direction does Gear B rotate, and at what speed?

Solution: Gears in mesh rotate in opposite directions. Gear B rotates counterclockwise. Speed = (Teeth A / Teeth B) × RPM A = (20/40) × 100 = 50 RPM.

Spatial Visualization Sample

Question: Which of the following nets (flat patterns) will fold into the cube shown? (Typical multiple-choice with four net diagrams).

Solution: This requires mental folding practice. Look for how adjacent faces connect. Test takers often find it helpful to physically draw or trace patterns during practice.

Reading Comprehension Sample

Passage excerpt: "All fall protection equipment must be inspected before each use. If any webbing is frayed or shows signs of cuts, the harness must be immediately removed from service."

Question: According to the passage, when should fall protection equipment be inspected?

Answer: Before each use.

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID

Even well-prepared candidates can make errors. Here are common pitfalls to avoid on the

- **Rushing through instructions:** Read each question carefully, especially in math. Misreading a unit (feet vs. inches) can waste time and cause wrong answers.
