The 2016 Super Bowl Ring (Patriots vs. Falcons): Following the historic 28-3 comeback in Super Bowl LI, the Patriots crafted a ring that matched the magnitude of the victory. It is one of the most expensive rings ever commissioned, featuring 283 diamonds for a total of 9.15 carats, plus sapphires. The ring is so elaborate that the Lombardi Trophy on top is removable. These rings are highly sought after by collectors who value toughness and the classic NFL aesthetic. They often sell in the \$150,000 to \$300,000 range, with a premium for rings belonging to Hall of Fame members.
