ESSENTIAL TOOLS

FOR PAPER QUILLING

- **Slotted quilling tool:**

Used for applying glue in small areas, for rolling tiny coils, and for lifting and positioning delicate shapes.

- **Quilling board or template:**

A cork or foam board with a grid and circles of various diameters helps you create uniform coils and

- **Tweezers:** Fine-tipped tweezers are invaluable for precise placement of rolled coils, especially in intricate **paper quilling designs**.

- **Craft glue:** A clear-drying, acid-free PVA glue (such as Elmer's or Tacky Glue) is essential. Use a toothpick or the tip of your needle tool to apply tiny dots.

- **Ruler, scissors, and a circle template:** Optional but helpful for measuring and creating consistent shapes.

You can find beginner

kits online that include all these supplies plus a few project patterns. As you become more comfortable, you may also explore edge quilling, comb quilling, or using a quilling comb for special effects.

BASIC TECHNIQUES EVERY QUILLER SHOULD KNOW

All **paper quilling designs** are built from a small set of fundamental shapes. Mastering these opens the door to endless creative possibilities. Below are the core techniques you will use repeatedly.

Coil

Insert one end of a paper strip into the slotted tool. Hold the tool in one hand and the paper in the other. Rotate the tool away from you while keeping even tension. Once the entire strip is rolled, carefully slide the coil off the tool and let it loosen slightly. Then apply a dab of glue to the end of the strip and press to secure. This basic circle is the starting point for many other shapes.

The Loose Coil

Follow the same steps as for a tight coil, but after sliding the coil off the tool, allow it to

relax and expand to a larger diameter. Use a template board to ensure consistent size. Glue the end. A loose coil is the foundation for teardrops, marquises, squares, and more.

Teardrop Shape

Create a loose coil. Pinch one side of the circle between your thumb and forefinger to form a point. The opposite side remains rounded. This shape is one of the most commonly used in **paper quilling designs**, especially for petals and leaves.

Marquise

(or Eye) Shape

Start with a loose coil. Pinch both sides simultaneously to create two pointed ends, like an eye or a football. This shape works beautifully for leaves, stems, and decorative borders.

Square and Rectangle

Make a loose coil. Pinch one side to form a point, then pinch the opposite side. Next, pinch the two remaining sides to create four points. Use your fingers to flatten the sides slightly into straight lines. This

shape the piece for geometric **paper quilling designs** and patterns.

Scrolls

Scrolls are coils that are not glued shut. Open scrolls have loose ends that curl inward or outward. The V-scroll, heart scroll, and S-scroll are popular choices for adding elegant flourishes to any quilled piece.

Practice these shapes until you can produce them consistently. Many quillers enjoy the repetitive, meditative nature of rolling and shaping. Once you are comfortable, you can combine shapes to create flowers, animals, letters, and abstract patterns.

STEP-BY-STEP: CREATING YOUR FIRST PAPER QUILLING DESIGN

Ready to begin? Let's walk through a simple project: a quilled daisy flower. This will help you put the basic techniques into practice.

1. **Gather your supplies:** White and yellow quilling strips (1/8 inch), a slotted tool, glue,

- tweezers, and a background card or canvas.
2. **Make the petals:** Roll eight loose coils from white paper. Pinch each into a teardrop shape. Set them aside.
 3. **Create the center:** Roll a tight coil from a yellow strip. Apply glue to the end. For a textured look, you can loosen it slightly and reshape it into a dome.
 4. **Assemble:** Arrange the teardrops in a circle, points facing outward. Glue them together at their rounded ends. Place the yellow tight coil in the center and press gently to adhere.
 5. **Attach to background:** Apply a small amount of glue to the back of the daisy and press it onto your card or canvas.
 6. **Add a stem and leaves:** For a more complete **paper quilling design**, create a marquise leaf (green) and a stem from a straight piece of green paper. Glue them in place.
- Congratulations! You have created your first quilled flower. From here, you can experiment with different petal counts, colors, and additional shapes.
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TO ELEVATE YOUR QUILLING
