- Whole grain bread or pasta (in controlled portions).

FOODS TO EMBRACE AND FOODS TO MINIMIZE

Sugar-Sweetened Beverages: This includes soda, sweet tea, fruit juice, and energy drinks. They are a primary source of empty calories and cause rapid, significant blood sugar spikes. This is one of the most impactful changes you can make. **Refined Grains:** White bread, white rice, regular pasta, and many

processed cereals are low in fiber and nutrients. They are digested quickly and can disrupt glucose control. **Trans and Saturated Fats:** Limit intake of fried foods, processed snacks, fatty cuts of red meat, and full-fat dairy products. These can impair insulin sensitivity and worsen cardiovascular health. **Highly Processed Foods:** Chips, crackers, baked goods, and frozen meals often contain a combination of refined carbs, unhealthy fats, and added sugars. **Dried Fruit and Fruit Juice:** While fruit is healthy, these concentrated forms can supply a large amount of sugar in a small serving, making blood sugar management more difficult.

MENU: PUTTING IT
ALL TOGETHER**

To demonstrate how these principles work in real life, here is a sample day of eating that aligns with a balanced type 2 diabetes diet plan. Portion sizes should be adjusted based on your individual needs, activity level, and healthcare provider's recommendations.

Breakfast (Around 8:00 AM)

- Top with a quarter of an avocado and a light vinaigrette dressing (olive oil and vinegar).
- A small portion of quinoa (1/2 cup cooked) on the side or on top of the salad.

Afternoon Snack (Optional - Around 4:00 PM)

- A small handful of almonds (about 15-20) or a piece of low-fat string cheese.

Dinner (Around 7:00 PM)

- Baked or grilled salmon fillet (4-6 oz) seasoned with herbs and lemon.
- A generous

portion of roasted non-starchy vegetables (broccoli, bell peppers, and asparagus) tossed in olive oil.

- A small sweet potato (half a medium-sized one) or a serving of brown rice (1/2 cup cooked).

Find Healthy Substituti ons You Enjoy

Instead of feeling deprived, focus on what you can have. If you love pasta, try whole-wheat pasta in sensible portions or

experiment with spiralized zucchini or butternut squash noodles. If you crave something sweet, have a piece of fresh fruit or a small square of dark chocolate (70% cocoa or higher). The goal is to satisfy cravings without derailing your blood sugar control. Learn to cook your favorite dishes with healthier ingredients.

Monitor Your Body's Response

Everyone responds to food differently. Use your blood glucose monitor as a learning tool. Check your blood sugar about two hours after eating to see how

a particular meal affected you. This feedback is invaluable. Did that serving of brown rice spike your sugar? Would a smaller portion or a different complex carb work better? This knowledge allows you to fine-tune your personal type 2 diabetes diet plan with precision.

Stay Hydrated
