# Protection and Shape

## The Middle Layer: The Vascular

This layer is packed with blood vessels and contains the muscles that control the pupil.

- **Choroid:**

Located between the sclera and the retina, the choroid is a dense network of blood vessels. It supplies oxygen and nutrients to the outer layers of the retina. A good worksheet might ask students to note that this layer is dark to absorb stray light and prevent internal reflection.

- **Ciliary Body:**

This ring of tissue produces the aqueous humor (the fluid

in the front of the eye) and contains the ciliary muscles. These muscles change the shape of the lens to allow us to focus on near or distant objects—a process called accommodation.

- **Iris:** The colored part of the eye, the iris is a circular muscle. It expands and contracts to control the size of the pupil, regulating how much light enters the eye. Worksheet matching sections often pair the iris with the function of light regulation.
- **Pupil:** The black circle in the

center of the iris. It is not a solid structure but an opening. Worksheets emphasize that the pupil is actually a hole that allows light to pass through to the lens and retina.

## The Inner Layer: The Screen of Sight

The deepest layer is where the magic of vision truly begins.

- **Retina:** The light-sensitive tissue lining the

back of the eye. It contains millions of photoreceptor cells called rods (for low-light vision) and cones (for color and detail). When light hits these cells, they trigger electrical signals that travel to the brain.

- **Fovea:** A small, central pit in the retina packed exclusively with cones. This is the area of sharpest visual acuity. When you look directly at an object, you are aligning it with your fovea. An advanced worksheet might ask students to explain why peripheral vision is less sharp.

- **Optic Disc:** The exit point where the optic nerve leaves the eye. Because there are no photoreceptors here, every eye has a natural blind spot. A playful “find your blind spot” experiment is a popular addition to many worksheets.

- **Lens:** A flexible, transparent structure located directly behind the iris. The lens fine-tunes the focus of light onto the retina. Worksheets often highlight how the lens flattens for distance vision and becomes rounder for near vision, and how this elasticity decreases with age (presbyopia).

## The Transpar ent Path: Lens and Humors

These structures help focus and maintain the shape of the eye.

- **Aqueous Humor:** A watery fluid filling the space between the cornea and the lens. It provides nutrients and maintains intraocular pressure. Questions about glaucoma often stem from this

structure.

- **Vitreous**

**Humor:** A clear, jelly-like substance that fills the large space between the lens and the retina. It gives the eye its spherical shape and is present from birth. Unlike the aqueous humor, it does not regenerate.

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### HOW TO EFFECTIVELY USE AN ANATOMY OF THE EYE WORKSHEET
