WHEN EXACTLY DO GEESE FLY SOUTH BY REGION?

The timing of the autumn migration is not the same everywhere. It varies significantly based on latitude, local climate, and the specific subspecies of goose. Generally, the migration begins in late August and can continue into December. However, the peak movement occurs during a narrower window. Northern Breeding Grounds: Canada and Alaska

If you live in states like Minnesota, Wisconsin, New York, or Michigan, the answer to **when do geese fly south** is typically mid-October through Thanksgiving. Flocks become larger and more frequent as the month progresses. By December, most of the migratory geese have passed through, though some resident populations may remain if there is open water.

The Pacific and Atlantic Flyways

Geese follow specific air highways called flyways. On the Atlantic Flyway, geese from the Hudson Bay region and the Maritime provinces begin moving south in September, with the peak often in November around the Chesapeake Bay area. On the Pacific Flyway, geese move through British Columbia, Washington, and Oregon. Here, the timing is similar, with the bulk of the migration occurring from October through November. In milder coastal areas, the migration can be more drawn out, with some geese not moving until December if food and water remain available.

DIFFERENT SPECIES, DIFFERENT SCHEDULES

Not all geese migrate at the same time. There are several species, and each has its own timetable. Understanding these differences gives a more complete answer to **when do geese fly south**.

- **Canada Geese:** These are the most familiar and widespread. Their migration window is broad, from September to November. However, many populations of Canada geese have become "resident" and do not migrate at all if the climate is mild.

- **White-fronted Geese:** These geese are intermediate in their timing. They typically migrate from mid-September through October, passing through the central United States on their way to the Gulf Coast.

THE JOURNEY: HOW FAR AND HOW FAST?

The distance traveled varies. Some geese may only fly a few hundred miles, while others, like those from the Arctic, may travel over 3,000 miles. They fly at speeds of 40 to 50 miles per hour, often at altitudes of 1,000 to 3,000 feet, though they have been recorded much higher. The classic V-formation is not just for show. It is a highly efficient arrangement that reduces wind resistance for the birds behind the leader. The geese take turns leading, sharing the energetic burden of breaking the air. This teamwork allows the flock to fly 70% further than a bird flying alone.

Navigation: How Do They Know Where to Go?

Geese are born with an innate sense of direction and a magnetic compass. They use the Earth's magnetic field, the position of the sun, and even landmarks like rivers and mountain ranges to find their way. Young geese learn the specific route from their parents during their first migration, memorizing the key stopover sites. This is why family groups stay together during the journey. The knowledge of where to go is passed down through generations.

TOO LATE?

The timing of the migration is critical. If geese leave too early, they might miss out on good feeding opportunities in the north. If they leave too late, they risk getting caught in severe winter storms or finding their wintering grounds already frozen.
