WHAT IS A TILE CUTTER AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

HOW TO USE A TILE CUTTER: STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE

Using a Manual Tile Cutter

5. **Remove small nibs.** Sometimes tiny chips remain on the edge. Use a tile file or the notches on the cutter’s base to smooth them off. For L-shaped cuts, you may need to make multiple passes or use a tile nipper.

Using a Wet Tile Saw

1. **Set up the saw correctly.** Place the saw on a stable surface and fill the water tray. Ensure the blade guard is in place and that the power cord is away from water.
2. **Adjust the fence.** The fence guides the tile in a straight line. Set it to the desired width of your cut. For rip cuts, the fence is used. For crosscuts, you may use the miter gauge.
3. **Dry-fit the cut.** Rest the tile against the fence and dry-fit to ensure the line aligns with the blade path. Never cut without confirming alignment.
4. **Start the saw and let it reach full speed.** The blade should be spinning smoothly before you introduce the tile. Slowly push the tile toward the blade, keeping it flat against the fence.
5. **Feed the tile gently.** Let the blade do the work. Do not force the tile; pushing too hard can cause chipping or blade binding. Use a push stick for small pieces to keep your hands at a safe distance.
6. **Turn off the saw after the cut** and wait for the blade to stop before removing the cut tile. Wipe the tile dry to inspect the edge.

TIPS FOR PERFECT CUTS EVERY TIME

- **Always score from the same starting point.** Consistency in pressure and speed leads to more predictable snaps.

- **Cutting narrow strips.** For strips narrower than 1 inch, it is often better to score from both ends and then snap with pliers. Alternatively, use a tile nipper for very small pieces.
- **Wet saw blade care.** A dull blade will cause chipping. Dress the blade by cutting a soft abrasive block, or replace it when it becomes worn.

COMMON MISTAKES BEGINNERS MAKE WHEN USING A TILE CUTTER

Check that the base is flat – a warped base will cause crooked cuts. Store the cutter in a dry place to prevent rust.

For wet saws, empty the water tray after each use to prevent bacterial growth and rust. Inspect the blade for chips or wear. Replace the blade when it

becomes dull. Check the motor brushes if the saw seems to lose power. A well-maintained wet saw will last for years and deliver consistent results.
