A LITERAL MARIA CALLAS CASTA DIVA

TRANSLATION: THE ITALIAN TEXT AND ENGLISH MEANING

The text of "Casta Diva" is poetic and rich with religious and natural imagery. To provide a comprehensive **Maria**

Temper, O Goddess, temper the ardent hearts, temper still the bold zeal, spread on earth that peace, which you make reign in heaven, which you make reign in heaven, spread on earth that peace, which you make reign in heaven.

This is the core of her plea. She is asking the goddess to calm the "ardent hearts" and "bold zeal" of the Druids who are eager for war. She wants the peace of heaven to descend upon the earth. A literal **Maria Callas Casta Diva translation** captures this public prayer, but the subtext is deeply personal: she is begging for peace from her own internal war.

Third Stanza (The Foreshad owing):

Italian: Finché al trono, finché al trono del crin del sole, non sia questo, non sia questo mio, mio sì caro, caro, oggetto, oggetto d'amor, o sia questo, o sia questo mio sì caro oggetto d'amor.

This line is grammatically ambiguous and often debated, but it generally refers to her hope that her love (Pollione) will be safe until the time when the sun itself is threatened. It is a moment of private longing within the public prayer.

When we examine this **Maria Callas Casta Diva translation**, we see a woman speaking to two audiences: the visible one of her people and the invisible one of her heart and her goddess.
