The Sporades

- **Main islands:** Skiathos, Skopelos, Alonissos, Skyros.
- **Characteristics:** Pine-covered mountains, clear waters, and relaxed atmosphere. Alonissos is part of a marine park.
- **Map focus:** Topographic maps for hiking in Skopelos; ferry connections are frequent from Volos.

The Saronic Islands

- **Location:** Close to Athens, in the Saronic Gulf.
- **Main islands:** Hydra, Spetses, Aegina, Poros, Agistri.
- **Characteristics:** Elegant, historic, with many neoclassical mansions. Hydra has no cars.
- **Map focus:** Detailed walking maps of Hydra and Spetses are invaluable as transport is on foot or donkey.

Crete

- **Location:** Southernmost large island of Greece, between the Aegean and Libyan seas.
- **Main towns:** Heraklion, Chania, Rethymno, Agios Nikolaos.
- **Characteristics:** Rugged

mountains (Lefka Ori, Psiloritis), deep gorges like Samaria, and Minoan archaeological treasures.

- **Map focus:** Road maps are necessary for driving across the island; hiking maps for the Gorge of Samaria and other trails are popular.

Northern Aegean Islands

- **Location:** Close to Turkey, in the northeastern Aegean Sea.
- **Main islands:** Lesbos (Mytilene), Chios, Samos, Ikaria, Lemnos.
- **Characteristics:** Lush, with a rich history of trade and culture. Each island has unique local products (ouzo from Lesbos, mastic from Chios).
