## Sport Education Model

Developed by Daryl Siedentop, the Sport Education model turns the physical education class into a mini sports league. Students form teams that stay together for a season, take on roles such as captain, referee, statistician, and equipment manager, and compete in a schedule that includes preseason, regular season, and a culminating event. This strategy goes beyond skill development to teach responsibility, fair play, and the culture of sport. Students become invested in their team's success and learn to manage themselves, which frees the teacher to act as a facilitator rather than a constant director.

## Technology Integration

Technology has opened new avenues for teaching strategies in physical education. Wearable fitness trackers, heart rate monitors, and movement analysis apps provide real-time data that students and teachers can use to set goals and monitor progress.
