This scenario, proponents argue, perfectly explains several anomalies:

- **The Backward and Leftward Head Snap:** The famous Zapruder film shows President Kennedy's head snapping violently backward and to the left. Critics of the lone-gunman theory have long argued that a bullet from the rear (from the Book Depository) should have propelled the head forward. A shot from the front-right (from the follow-up car's position) would logically cause the backward snap observed in the film.
- **The Severe Wound to the Back of the Head:** The autopsy photos and reports describe a massive, avulsive wound to the back right of the President's skull. The Mortal Error theory suggests this is consistent with the high-velocity, soft-point ammunition used by the Secret Service, which would expand and cause catastrophic damage upon entry.
- **The Trajectory Puzzle:** The angle of entry for the fatal headshot has been a point of contention. While the Warren Commission placed the fatal shot from the sixth-floor window, many independent experts have concluded that the angle is too steep for a shot from that location, given

the height of the limousine and the position of the President's head. The angle from the follow-up car aligns more closely with the autopsy evidence.

EXAMINING THE BALLISTIC AND PHOTOGRAPHIC EVIDENCE

However, the head snap is backward. The Mortal Error theory reconciles this by arguing that the bullet causing the massive exit wound did indeed enter from the back, but from a position directly behind and slightly to the right of the limousine. This position is exactly where the Secret Service follow-up car was located. A bullet from that angle would cause the bullet to travel

through the brain and exit the front right of the skull, creating the backward head snap as a result of the explosive pressure and the jet effect of the exiting tissue.

The Autopsy Report and the X-Rays

The official autopsy report, conducted at Bethesda Naval Hospital, is described by some as incomplete and, at times, contradictory. One of the key pieces of evidence cited by proponents of the Mortal Error theory is the location of the small entry wound on the back of the President's head. The autopsy doctors initially described this wound as being in the occipital region, near the hairline. This location, combined with the low angle of the wound track, is difficult to reconcile with a shot from the sixth floor of the Book Depository. The Mortal Error theory posits that this wound is perfectly consistent with a shot fired from a weapon held by an agent in the car directly behind the President. The agent, standing up in a moving vehicle, would have been at a lower height than a sixth-floor window, creating a flatter, more horizontal trajectory.

Furthermore, the AR-15 is a powerful rifle. If a bullet from that weapon had struck the President in the back of the head

from a short distance, the damage would have been immense and the bullet would likely have exited with tremendous force. The bullet that struck Governor Connally, which some tie to Oswald, was later found on a hospital stretcher in relatively good condition. The proponents of the Mortal Error theory argue that the official evidence is either misinterpreted or suppressed, but skeptics maintain that the physical evidence is more consistent with a single shooter.

The Character of George Hickey
